Useful facts about Barford

- Population of circa 2,000 people living within 900m of the proposed site
- Barford Village School just 650m away from the site and educates up to 250 children
- Prevailing wind direction is from the south and west and will carry dust over the village
- Barford is a gateway village for the Cotswolds (an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty), fed by the busy M40 junctions 14 and 15
- The land is well draining and 'best most versatile' and so good it can grow two salad crops per year

Facts from Smiths proposals

- ·89 hectare site (much larger than Barford village)
- ·2 million tonnes of sand and gravel to be removed over a 10-15 year period
- · Monday to Saturday working from 7am each day, for 11 hours a day Monday-Friday
- •216 HGVs vehicle movements into or out of the site each day from the A429, equivalent to one lorry entering or leaving every 3 minutes Monday to Friday, 7am to 6pm!
- New traffic lights on the A429 to control lorry movements (which will increase congestion)
- ·There are 124 houses on Dugard Place and Sandy Way just 400m away
